 - (g) King David. 2 Samuel 11:1-27; 12:1-14; Psalm 51:1-19. True Repentance
 - (h) Nebuchadnezzar. Daniel 4:1-37. True Repentance
 - (i) King Asa. 2 Chronicles 15:1-19; 16:1-12. No Repentance
 - (j) King Uzziah. 2 Chronicles 26:16-21. No Repentance
 - (k) King Manasseh. 2 Chronicles 33:1-17. True Repentance
 - (1) Isaiah. Isaiah 6:1-7. True Repentance
 - (m) The Prodigal Son. Luke 15:11-21. True Repentance
 - (n) Peter. Luke 22:31-34; Matthew 26:69-75. True Repentance
 - (o) Judas Iscariot. Matthew 27:3-5. False Repentance
 - (p) Saul of Tarsus. Acts 9:1-20. True Repentance

 - 2) Based on this study, what in your mind are the marks of true/genuine repentance.
 - (a) Acknowledgment of guilt/admittance of sin
 - (b) A broken and contrite heart
 - (c) Confession of sin
 - (d) Acknowledgment of the Lordship of God and Christ over all things
 - (e) Godly sorrow for sin
 - (f) Change of heart/ change of disposition towards sin and sinful acts.

- 3) Why don't people repent or why do they repent falsely?
 - (a) WHY PEOPLE DON'T REPENT
 - i. They blame others
 - ii. They refuse to accept guilt
 - iii. They refuse to take responsibility for their actions/conduct
 - iv. Anger at those telling them that they have sinned
 - (b) WHY PEOPLE REPENT FALSELY
 - i. They feign repentance only because they have lost a blessing
 - ii. They feign repentance only because they were found out
 - iii. They feign repentance only because they want respite from the punishment or hardship they are facing.
 - iv. They feign repentance only because they want to look before people
 - v. Their repentance is an emotional act, without any recourse to God and righteousness
 - vi. They feign repentance only because they want something from God, and they believe that repentance will enable them gain access to it
 - vii. They feign repentance only because they want to avoid judgment or punishment

Conclusion

Our study has shown us that there is <u>true/genuine</u> repentance and there is also, <u>false/fake</u> repentance. Some of the parameters that must be present for repentance to be genuine include (any three of "B.2)" above). Also, some people neither repent at all nor repent genuinely because (any three of "B.3)" above).

Based on our study this week, we can therefore, define true repentance as <u>a permanent</u> <u>change of attitude towards sin and sinful living, resulting from a deep conviction and acknowledgement of guilt for sin, occasioned by a broken and contrite heart; leading to a change in action and behaviour to righteousness.</u>

<u>Note</u>: True repentance recognizes that sin is an offence and a transgression against God, not necessarily against man! (see **Genesis 39:9; Psalm 51:4**)
